Welcome Back!

During the Summer, Information Technology, the Office of Online Learning and Services, and the University Libraries have been busy updating software and adding new technology tools for faculty and students. Here are some of the highlights:

Classroom Technology

During the previous academic year, Information Technology and the Provost's Office met with faculty to review the technology installed in St. John's classrooms. From these meetings, a new technology standard was drafted and implemented for this academic year. The new technology standard includes: bright high definition projection, widescreen projection screen, document camera, confidence monitor, touch enabled monitor, lecture capture enabled, web conferencing enabled, and wireless presentation. Fourteen classrooms will be fully installed by Spring 2016.

Blackboard Hosting and Updates

The university has relocated the Blackboard Learning Management System service from our campus to servers managed by Blackboard, Inc. The relocation was necessary to support the growing demand for this service and will insure stable access in the future. At the same time, updates were made, as well as preparations for new Blackboard functionality in the Spring.

This is a customizable online system that allows faculty to create CVs and other reports on their teaching, research, and service. You can enter accomplishments in one location that can be then used for multiple purposes, including the AFAR report for full-time faculty, who will receive accounts in late September. Adjunct faculty accounts will be part of the second phase of the roll-out.

WebEx

The university has invested in <u>WebEx</u> software for all faculty to allow them to host virtual meetings and events, to collaborate online with students and colleagues, and to communicate with individuals around the world. WebEx is now available for full-time faculty; adjunct faculty will receive accounts later in the semester. Students will also be receiving accounts with more limited functionality.

lynda.com

The Office of Human Resources is offering an online library of training programs to full-time faculty. The one-year trial period with <u>lynda.com</u> includes unlimited access for faculty to over 3,300 video courses, some with corresponding interactive exercises. Popular training modules include Blackboard, WordPress, WebEx, MS Word, MS PowerPoint, and MS Excel. The content is up-to-date, there are beginner to advanced courses, and there is the option to watch complete courses or selected sections. If you are an adjunct faculty member, eStudio can arrange for you to have a lynda.com account on a monthly basis.

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Respondus

Given the importance of academic integrity at SJU, the Office of Online Learning and Services is pleased to announce two new tools to assist faculty in maintaining honesty and integrity in the online testing environment. Respondus LockDown Browser is a custom browser that locks down the testing environment within Blackboard. Respondus Monitor integrates webcam technology allowing faculty to confirm students' identities and monitor their activity during testing. A short <u>video</u> provides an introduction. Both tools are available for Windows, Mac, and iOS platforms.

CampusGuides Version 2

CampusGuides software is offered to all faculty through the University Libraries. The new version has an updated interface with more functionality. This easy-to-use tool can create course webpages, as well as websites to highlight your research or present information for your department or program.
