This faculty learning community's focus is to assist faculty in developing the technological aspects of their courses and Fellows serve for two years. Our Fellows are hard at work on their projects. In the upcoming issues we will highlight their projects.

CTL Fellow 2017—2019

Dr. Vivek Gupta

College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences, Pharmaceutical Sciences Dr. Gupta's project is focused on developing and implementing flipped classroom-active learning pedagogy for pharmaceutical science courses to enhance student learning and retention. Flipped classroom strategies coupled with active learning rely on shifting the onus of learning over to students, and have repeatedly shown enhanced student engagement with higher material retention due to incorporation of application-based activities in the curriculum. Dr. Gupta's goal for CTL fellowship is to demonstrate the feasibility of this approach by transitioning his

course/s to flipped classroom and generate relevant data for assessment.

CTL Fellow 2017—2019

Professor Claudia Sbrissa

St. John's College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, Art and Design Professor Sbrissa is exploring new 3D printing technologies in order to implement these into her Printmaking course. Her class will incorporate these skills to create a printed edition of works, which will be presented in a portfolio and exhibited in a display and also online.
